15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary
<p>The institution's profound vision and mission epicentre on the empowerment of rural women through a robust and high-quality educational framework. Pertaining to this vision, the institution has wholeheartedly adopted a multidisciplinary approach woven into both UG and PG curricula. This involves the incorporation of flexible and innovative course structures, underscored by the</p>

implementation of a Choice-Based Credit System. The primary objective is to acquaint learners with a spectrum of employment opportunities and entrepreneurial pathways, cultivating essential skills for both employability and entrepreneurship.

The PG and UG curricula offer various Elective/Non Major Elective Courses, Major/Core, Allied Courses that integrate multidisciplinary concepts such as Gender, Human Rights, Eco-consciousness, and Technical Innovations. Common courses like Introduction to Computers, Career Guidance, Environmental Studies, Value Education and Gender Studies aim to ensure that all students acquire fundamental technical skills and ethical and moral discernment. Final year UG students are allowed to choose from a variety of (21) job-oriented or self-employment courses offered by different departments. Students also learn NPTEL courses that cover disciplines like Psychology, Sociology, Linguistics, Communication, Environmental Studies, etc.

Research initiatives at UG, PG and Ph.D levels promote an interdisciplinary approach. Moreover, interdisciplinary research forums acquainting students with the potential for cross-disciplinary research. Students research projects tackle pertinent social issues, such as impact of social media, women empowerment through Self-Help Groups, socio-economic conditions of Sri Lankan refugees and the Narikuravar Community, effective usage of sustainable natural dyes in textiles, utilisation of wood waste, farmers' perception towards agricultural credit, building apps for self-health check-up, recognising sign language, etc.

The institution's commitment to interdisciplinary research is evident in its support for faculty across various disciplines, providing seed funding for diverse projects. Furthermore, the integration of humanities and science with STEM is also exemplified in ongoing faculty research projects that contribute to academic knowledge and also align with the institution's commitment to bridging gaps between disciplines. Faculty from both science and humanities departments like Tamil, Mathematics, Computer Science, etc., have undertaken interdisciplinary projects that involve other disciplines like Psychology, Environmental Studies, Management Studies, Visual Communication, Cultural Studies, Microbiology, etc.

Additionally, the institution endeavours to equip learners not only with subject-specific knowledge and communication skills but also with foundational knowledge across diverse disciplines. This comprehensive approach aims to enhance their

performance in higher education, employment, or entrepreneurial pursuits, thereby contributing to the empowerment of rural women.

16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):

- Automated Permanent Academic Account Registry (APAAR) aims to provide a unified and accessible academic experience for students across India by assigning a unique and permanent 12-digit ID to every student, consolidating their academic achievements in one place.
- According to the parameters given by the Ministry of Education, 1138 UG students and 277 PG students have created their Academic Bank of Credit IDs in our institution.
- The synergy of APAAR IDs, Academic Bank of Credit, and Digilocker, provide an easy platform for the students to access their digital academic records easily.

17. Skill development:

In order to acquire a wide range of abilities, including technical skills, soft skills, cognitive skills, and practical skills, various Skill development programmes are offered by the institution. For the academic year 2022-2023, 19 Job-oriented courses are designed to provide individuals with the specific skills and knowledge needed to excel in a particular profession or industry. These courses are often tailored to meet the demands of the job market and focus on enhancing the practical skills of the students. Courses like Functional Hindi and English for Employability develop the language skills of the students. Beautician Course, Modern Handicrafts, Herbal cosmetics improve their artistic skill. Mathematical Statistics, Domestic Electrical Appliances Services, Mobile Phone Servicing, Call Centre Management aid in developing technical skills. Courses on Food Processing and Preparation and Catering Technology and Hotel Management promote Culinary arts.

Depending upon the needs and requirements of students, Value Added Courses are provided which share the common goal of enriching the educational experience and preparing students for success in their academic and professional endeavours. Value Added Courses include 35 Certificate programmes, 5 Extra Credit courses, 8 Diploma courses, 12 YWED (Young Women Entrepreneurship Development Courses), 9 Short Term and 6 Long Term Skill Enhancement Courses. These courses are designed to go beyond the core curriculum and provide students with added value in terms of employability, personal development, or academic enrichment.

Moreover, the Communication skills of the students are developed through Expressive Articulation Session which is conducted once in a month, Oral practice given at Language Lab and various training programmes offered by the Placement cell. The aptitude skills of the students are pruned through GK and Career Guidance course provided in the curriculum and the aptitude coaching provided by Placement cell. In order to develop the leadership skill of the students, Personality Development Cell of the college through various Personality Development programmes plays a crucial role in nurturing individuals' holistic development, empowering them to thrive personally and professionally in a rapidly changing world. Students' leadership skill is promoted by assigning them various leadership roles- Representatives and Assistant Representatives in class rooms, College Student President, Secretary and Members in College Students Union and Student Coordinators in various programmes. Through various encouraging participation in community service projects, volunteering activities, and social outreach programmes, a sense of social responsibility and empathy among the students are instilled. By offering a lot of skill development programmes, the students of the institution acquire, improve and master skills, abilities or competencies that are valuable in various aspects of life, such as personal growth, professional advancement, and social interaction.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

SFRC takes efforts to preserve and promote Indian Traditional Knowledge, Indian culture and Traditions, and Indian Arts by conducting various Certificate/Diploma programmes, and organizing seminars/ workshops. SFRC strives to familiarize Indian knowledge systems to the younger generation through appropriate methodology and supervision.

Certificate in Koyil Marabugal, Diploma in Thol Avanangal promote Indian culture. Certificate/Diploma in Gandhian thought, Traditional Mathematical Concepts, Certificate in Food Preparation, Food Preservation, Certificate in Herbal Cosmetics, Indian Cuisines, Painting, Museology, and Certificate in Yoga are some of the courses taught related to Indian traditional knowledge systems.

Skill courses on Silk worm cocoon crafts and Vermicomposting are also offered.

Young Women Entrepreneur Development Centre, ACIDE and IIIC are concerned with assisting budding entrepreneurs in boosting

their existing skills and abilities to become more proficient in handling their businesses. Training programmes are conducted for students who are aimed at accentuating entrepreneurial acumen.

Since our institution is located in rural area and most of the students are coming from rural background, it's a common practice to handle classes in bilingual mode (English and Tamil) to make the students feel comfortable.

Also, at the beginning of each academic year, Bridge courses are conducted to freshers by all the departments in order to bridge the gap between subjects studied at Higher Secondary level and subjects they would be studying in Graduation.

Certificate Programme in Cultural Studies is offered by the Centre for Cultural Studies and PG and Research Department of English. The course is instructed in collaboration of the Departments of English, Tamil and History. This programme delineates Indian culture in fiction, folklore, archives and museum where teachers guide students to do projects on folklore, fiction and museology.

Projects on "Badrakaliamman as a Folk Deity", "Role of Archives in Preserving Culture" were carried out by students. Depiction of Indian culture in fiction was observed in the project "A Sociological Analysis of Shashi Deshpande's Small Remedies".

Socioreligious beliefs in India were studied in the project "Detailed analysis on Premchand's novel *Godaan*".

The Centre for Cultural studies has planned to enter into an MoU with Association for Cultural Studies, Finland. Youth Welfare Forum organizes Talent Show for freshers to showcase their talents and Fine Arts Fiesta where about 14 competitions relating to Indian culture are conducted. Wearing ethnic attire is given importance by observing Ethnic wear day once in a month. Pongal is celebrated in the college campus as Samathuva Pongal reinforcing traditional knowledge in practice.

Martial arts are codified systems and traditions of combat practices, which are practiced for a variety of reasons - self-defence, competition, physical health and fitness, entertainment, as well as mental, physical, and spiritual development.

India has an ancient tradition in martial arts. Nearly every part of India has evolved one or the other form of popular

martial art. Silambam is an Ancient Martial art of Tamil Nadu. Students are trained in Silambam and Taekwondo and they bring laurels to our institution.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

Outcome Based Education:

The implementation of Outcome-Based Education (OBE), a unique feature of the SFRC, was carried out by a dedicated team led by the Director of the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) from the academic year 2019-2020, considering the need for it after getting the Official approval from the OBE Expert and Academic Council.

Concrete initiatives have been taken to transform the curricula from a regular teaching/learning process to an outcome-oriented student centric approach.

This performance-based training was constantly practiced by conducting several workshops/trainings for the newly recruited and juvenile faculty members to understand and implement its principles.

The following timeline shows the steps taken by the institution to implement OBE:

- Following the guidelines of Outcome-Based Education (OBE), the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) determined the methods for formulating the learning outcomes, assessment tools, and procedures for measuring students' achievement.
- The Programme Outcomes (POs) were developed according to the Graduate Attributes recommended by the (UGC).
- The IQAC created thematic templates for the PEOs and PSOs to aid the departments.
- The Heads of Departments (HODs) presented the Departmental PEOs/PSOs in the College Council for review.
- The IQAC organized workshops to help faculty members to develop course outcomes that enhance the quality of education through outcome-based curriculum and assessment methods.
- The IQAC and CDDC provided hands-on training to staff members responsible for the syllabus, to help them map COs with Program Outcomes POs and calculate the weighted average of Performance Assessment Marks (PAM).
- The Office of Controller of Examination revised the format for Term Tests and Model Question papers based on suggestions from

the IQAC. These revised formats were validated by Head of Departments (HODs) and the Controller of Examination (COE).

- The Office of COE, in collaboration with the IQAC, conducted a workshop for External Examiners on setting and evaluating Outcomes Based Education (OBE)-based End Semester examination questions.
- OBE modules were now implemented in a cloud-based Educational Resource Management System (ERMS). The IQAC provided training to staff members on uploading syllabi and creating rubrics for CIA and Practical components.
- An Academic Attainment Committee was established based on the advice from the IQAC. This committee claimed responsibility in collecting and reviewing electronically generated course attainment and justification reports. Corrective actions were taken for the courses that did not achieve the targeted CO attainment.

Milestones Achieved:

- The faculty members play the multiple roles of an instructor, trainer, facilitator, and mentor, to achieve the targeted outcomes.
- Clearly defined outcomes enabled SFRC to promptly assess students' accomplishments that resulted in enhanced student progress.

Individualized and Comprehensive Review of Pedagogics, Academic Performance and Course Outcomes:

Course outcomes were measured continuously, and the results were indirectly used to assess the teaching and learning process. The course outcomes were evaluated based on the students' performance in their continuous internal assessments and the End Semester Examination.

Review through Result analysis and Academic Performance:

- Every Department submits the End Semester Result Analysis Reports to the Result Analysis Committee in the specific format, for scrutinizing the pass percentages.
- These reports highlight the top-performing students in each course, as well as the percentages of students within different score ranges: more than 90%, 80-90%, 70-80%, 60-70%, 50-60%, and less than 50%.
- The objective of this result analysis is to identify the reasons for any failures as reported by the course teachers

and students and inform it to the Principal and the COE.

- Courses in which less than 60% of students passed received special attention. The respective course teachers were recommended to ensure the progress of the slow bloomers.
- The Semester-wise Academic Performance Report for both staff and students tracks the status of failures and proper guidance is given to the students until they pass.
- The review of the Result Analysis and Academic Performance helped in understanding the students' performance in both internal and external assessments. This information is utilized to leverage strengths and opportunities and address any weaknesses to ensure examinations and evaluation processes are free from any procedural irregularities and any form of bias.

Review through Course Attainment Reports:

- IQAC devised methods to measure the achievement of COs and POs using both direct and indirect assessment techniques. Expected Levels of Attainment for PEOs and POs is set for each batch. CO attainment levels were classified into three categories: Level 1, Level 2, and Level 3 in accordance with OBE guidelines.
- Faculty members create course-specific Work Plans and Constructive Alignments following the Academic Calendar at the beginning of each semester. Course Teachers systematically plan the Teaching Methods, Learning Activities, and Assessment Tools in Constructive Alignment.
- ERMS support the staff members in uploading Syllabus and creating Rubrics for CIA components. Rubrics were approved by HODs after the Assessment Summary was reviewed and validated. Subsequently, student scores for CIA components were uploaded. Staff members received appropriate training to effectively handle the ERMS portal, and with an ongoing training programme they were updated on the features of the new portal. In the ERMS Faculty portal, Course Attainment Statements were generated that analyzed class-wise and student-wise performance based on their specified attainment levels.
- Course Attainment Reports, along with the corrective action plans by the Course Teachers to address the identified curriculum gaps, were submitted to AAC.
- Performance Analysis Reports that generated class-wise and student-wise from ERMS, displayed the percentage of attainment in all K-levels and compared the individual student's performance against the class average. The class wise analysis reported on the attainment of all COs across all components.

- Direct PO Attainment is determined through the Performance Analysis Report, while Indirect PO Attainment is calculated based on the results of the Graduate Exit survey. PO Attainments were assessed and reviewed regularly.

Various effective mechanisms for reviewing and enhancing the Teaching-Learning processes were kept in place to enhance the reliability, transparency, and accuracy of the Evaluation system.

Holistic Development of Learners through Comprehensive Attainment:

The successful integration of OBE into the curriculum highlights the significant role of IQAC in establishing standards for evaluating the overall achievement of students. The IQAC assess students' proficiency not only in their main subjects but also in their extracurricular and co-curricular activities using OBE. This approach allowed IQAC to track and document each student's holistic development by evaluating both their academic and non-academic skills. Academic achievement was evaluated by comparing students' performance at class and individual levels against predetermined benchmarks, which lead to the analysis and grading of their performance. Non-academic achievement was determined by students' level of involvement and accomplishments in various non-academic areas.

Upon successful completion of the programme, students received the Comprehensive Attainment Statement in addition to their marks, which displayed their grades on a Ten-point scale and details of their academic and non-academic skills. The tutors assigned to each student group played a crucial role in maintaining the records of non-academic achievements. They motivated students to learn in a personalized and flexible manner that enabled them to reach their full potential. The accomplishments and participation of students in extracurricular activities were consistently logged in the ERMS system with the supporting documentation such as certificates and awards. Department heads were authorized to approve all tutor-entered data in the ERMS to ensure its accuracy. These Comprehensive Attainment Statements, reflected the efforts of the IQAC, were generated in the ERMS and were certified by the COE and Principal, to showcase the students' holistic development.

20.Distance education/online education:

Distance education/online education:

Blended learning, also known as hybrid learning, is an

educational strategy that combines traditional classroom teaching with online learning. Students can take online courses to learn the basics of a topic.

In the realm of vocational education, SFRC has been pioneering blended learning since 2020. Attuned to the needs of the local community, SFRC has curated a diverse portfolio of certificate programs and short-term courses aimed at skill development.

During the summer break, two Young Women Entrepreneurship Development (YWED) courses, namely Digital Photo Print, and E-Services, were thoughtfully conducted using a blend of in-person and online learning methods. The S.F.R College Alumnae Association gracefully hosted a complimentary online course on "Photoshop and its Tools" for the institution's esteemed alumni. Utilizing the digital platforms of Google Meet and Classroom, the course unfolded over a span of 10 enriching hours. The event was graced by the participation of 22 alumnae, adding to the vibrancy of the learning experience.

The institution has established and equipped a cutting-edge Green Matte Studio for the production of video lessons. Creating e-content for teaching is like crafting a journey of discovery for students. The video lessons created using the Green Matte Studio foster a love for learning. It's about using the power of digital media to make complex concepts accessible, engaging, and fun. Faculty members contribute video lessons to SFRC CONNECT, the institution's YouTube channel, which currently hosts 414 videos with 4.57K subscribers. The staff is encouraged to participate in NPTEL courses, and students who complete these courses are rewarded with academic credits. In the academic year 2022-23, 16 students and 36 faculty members passed the NPTEL Exam.

In the pursuit of blended learning, SFRC has made a strategic investment in the installation of sophisticated hardware for a Lecture Capturing System. To date, the portal has been populated with 2804 recorded lectures. This system is employed in real-time and the archived lectures are disseminated to students, serving as a valuable resource for both learning and reference.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates cross-cutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability, and Human Values into the curriculum

Both undergraduate (UG) and postgraduate (PG) curricula incorporate a diverse array of interdisciplinary courses focusing on significant societal subjects such as gender, human values, ethics, and environmental concerns to foster awareness regarding relevant social, cultural, and environmental issues.

Courses like Women Entrepreneurship, Literature and Gender, Value Education and Gender Studies, Women Studies Through the Ages, Human Rights and Gender, Labour Law, Human Resource Management, Human Development, Family Resource Management, Community Nutrition are woven into various programs to instill human values and advance gender sensitivity and equality.

Additionally, some courses focus on personal and professional ethics, including Cyber Security, Food Safety and Quality Control, Ara Ilakiyam and Applied Biology and Biosafety. PG programmes include a Research Methodology course to promote research ethics. PG Project Reports undergo plagiarism checks to develop ethical research practices.

To promote eco-consciousness and emphasize the importance of sustainable living, an array of courses is available, including Eco-centric Writings, Ecocide and History, Ecology and Bioremediation, Energy Resources, etc. Environmental Studies is a compulsory Part IV course in the UG Curriculum.

Part V Courses, including National Service Scheme, Environmental Club, Red Ribbon Club, etc., encourage social service habits. Overall, the curriculum emphasizes human values, gender sensitivity, sustainability, and ethical conduct.

Following the IQAC mandate, the academic calendar maintains transparency and follows schedules strictly.

The classroom instruction follows the work plan and adheres to the constructive alignment as given in the handbook. Adhering to constructive alignment, the course teachers systematically plan the teaching methods, learning activities, and assessment tools.

The Semester Monitoring Cell (SMC) prepares the plans for conducting the Continuous Internal Assessment. It is also responsible for conducting on time the three Term tests, three quizzes, and two assignments for every semester and adheres to the dates as specified in the handbook. The portions for internal tests are discussed and planned in the Council Meeting. Before the commencement of the end-semester practical examinations, the syllabus for the term is completed.

The Head of the Department and the SMC members verify and approve the syllabus, question papers, and rubrics for Internal Assessment as prepared by the Course Teachers. Within the stipulated time, the marks for the Quiz, Assignments, and Seminars are entered in the cloud-based ERMS.

IT Integration:

- The cloud-based ERMS helped to update the examination system, student enrolment, statement of marks, calculation of PO, CO, and measure the comprehensive attainment of targets by students.

Examnr.io:

- As per OBE guidelines, the Examnr.io software, with its chosen CO, K-level parameters, was utilized for developing the quiz and the assignment components in the Continuous Internal Assessment for the year 2022-2023.
- For theory courses, the course teachers conducted the online quizzes and other related assignments.
- The performance analysis of the students and final reports on the course outcomes were generated on the cloud-based portal (<https://www.erms.sfrwsw.in>)
- To schedule and evaluate assessments, hands-on training was given to our Faculty members.

Reforms:

- For gaining real-time exposure from industries and services, internship had been made mandatory for students undergoing UG programmes.
- For error-free, faster publication of results, centralized question paper setting and valuation system were followed.

Continuous Internal Assessment:

- The weightage of marks for CIA, end-semester examinations was fixed at 40% and 60% respectively.
- For calculating the final score for the CIA assessment, the average of the best two term test marks out of three for 25 marks, the average of the best two quizzes for 10 marks, and the average of two assignments for 5 marks were considered.
- The question papers for the term tests, and end semester examination were OBE-based with reference to course outcomes, Bloom's K level standards, and the assessment summary.

By means of internal and external audit procedures, SFRC maintains accuracy and transparency in financial management. Internal audit involves preparation of Half-yearly financial reports, daily account chartering by office employees and verification by Principal.

External audit is performed by Certified Public Accountants. Copy of institution's financial statements, its bank accounts, its assets register, and its budget plans for the past and current fiscal years are thoroughly examined by the audit team. Advance deposits, caution money, Salary Registration, employee salaries, tax deductions, and Provident Fund/ESI register are examined and verified during the Audit. Online tax returns are filed along with an audited statement of income and expense and Annual Statutory Report.

Bi-annually, institution's financial and administrative operations are subjected to statutory compliance audit by audit team from Joint Directorate of Collegiate Education, Madurai. A certified audit report is delivered to Chennai Account General Office. Authorities of Co-operative Societies Audit Students' Co-operative Store once per cooperative year.

Settlement of Audit Objections:

Audit objections relating to method of accounting, misappropriation of funds, compliance with legislative

requirements are reported to Management and are promptly notified to the Principal and corrected immediately. When raised by audit team, such minor complaints are resolved instantly.

- Utilizing Green Matte Studio for innovative content creation.
- Implementation of Lecture Capturing System (LCS).

These resources foster a continuous improvement cycle for teaching faculty, encouraging enhancement and innovation of their pedagogical approaches. The Cell consistently submits monthly reports on E-Contents developed and LCS activities to Management, facilitated through Principal and IQAC channels.

Enhancing Learning Pathways: Result Analysis and Academic Performance:

IQAC has formulated strategies for quantification of learning outcomes through continuous review of teaching-learning process. Result Analysis Reports generated after End Semester examinations play a crucial role in evaluating student performance and course outcomes. This statistic reveals proportion of students who successfully passed a particular course and categorizes student

scores into different percentage slabs. Pass percentage of courses which are less than 60 percent are reviewed and course teachers are heard by Awards committee.

Semester wise Academic Performance Report of Staff and Students clarifies the status of failures and tracks them for support until they pass a particular course. The review processes make examination and evaluation free from procedural irregularities and bias..

Enhancement in Examination and Evaluation Reforms:

The introduction of Examnr.io, a cloud-based solution, marks a shift from traditional paper-based examinations to an online system. IQAC, in collaboration with CoE, has played a pivotal role in implementing this platform. Continuous hands-on training has empowered staff to proficiently create, schedule, and evaluate online assessments. Examnr.io serves as primary tool for conducting quizzes, assignments, and end-semester Part IV exams. Not only does it make assessments more eco-friendly by transitioning to digital processes, but it also ensures robust security by securely storing all assessment details digitally.

Courses like Women Entrepreneurship, Literature and Gender, Value Education and Gender Studies, Women Studies Through the Ages, Human Rights and Gender, Labour Law, Human Resource Management, Human Development, Family Resource Management, Community Nutrition are woven into various programs to instill human values and advance gender sensitivity and equality.

Additionally, some courses focus on personal and professional ethics, including Cyber Security, Food Safety and Quality Control, Ara Ilakiyam and Applied Biology and Biosafety. PG programmes include a Research Methodology course to promote research ethics. PG Project Reports undergo plagiarism checks

to develop ethical research practices.

To promote eco-consciousness and emphasize the importance of sustainable living, an array of courses is available, including Eco-centric Writings, Ecocide and History, Ecology and Bioremediation, Energy Resources, etc. Environmental Studies is a compulsory Part IV course in the UG Curriculum.

Part V Courses, including National Service Scheme, Environmental Club, Red Ribbon Club, etc., encourage social service habits. Overall, the curriculum emphasizes human values, gender sensitivity, sustainability, and ethical conduct.

- As per OBE guidelines, the Examnr.io software, with its chosen CO, K-level parameters, was utilized for developing the quiz and the assignment components in the Continuous Internal Assessment for the year 2022-2023.
- For theory courses, the course teachers conducted the online quizzes and other related assignments.
- The performance analysis of the students and final reports on the course outcomes were generated on the cloud-based portal (<https://www.erms.sfrcls.in>)
- To schedule and evaluate assessments, hands-on training was given to our Faculty members.

Reforms:

- For gaining real-time exposure from industries and services, internship had been made mandatory for students undergoing UG programmes.
- For error-free, faster publication of results, centralized question paper setting and valuation system were followed.

Continuous Internal Assessment:

- The weightage of marks for CIA, end-semester examinations was fixed at 40% and 60% respectively.
- For calculating the final score for the CIA assessment, the average of the best two term test marks out of three for 25 marks, the average of the best two quizzes for 10 marks, and the average of two assignments for 5 marks were considered.
- The question papers for the term tests, and end semester examination were OBE-based with reference to course outcomes, Bloom's K level standards, and the assessment summary.

The well-equipped Information Resource Centre and Science Instrumentation Centre enhance researcher capabilities. The automated Information Resource Centre utilizes an Integrated Library Management System, offering e-books, e-journals, and access to e-Shodhsindhu and e-Shodhganga.

40 supervisors contribute towards the progression of research. 19 teachers were provided with seed money of 11.54 Lakhs by the management. 9 scholars completed their doctoral research. 6.4 - Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 - Institution conducts internal and external financial audits regularly

By means of internal and external audit procedures, SFRC maintains accuracy and transparency in financial management. Internal audit involves preparation of Half-yearly financial reports, daily account chartering by office employees and verification by Principal.

External audit is performed by Certified Public Accountants. Copy of institution's financial statements, its bank accounts, its assets register, and its budget plans for the past and current fiscal years are thoroughly examined by the audit team. Advance deposits, caution money, Salary Registration, employee salaries, tax deductions, and Provident Fund/ESI register are examined and verified during the Audit. Online tax returns are filed along with an audited statement of income and expense and Annual Statutory Report.

Bi-annually, institution's financial and administrative operations are subjected to statutory compliance audit by audit team from Joint Directorate of Collegiate Education, Madurai. A certified audit report is delivered to Chennai Account General Office. Authorities of Co-operative Societies Audit Students' Co-operative Store once per cooperative year.

Settlement of Audit Objections:

Audit objections relating to method of accounting,

misappropriation of funds, compliance with legislative requirements are reported to Management and are promptly notified to the Principal and corrected immediately. When raised by audit team, such minor complaints are resolved instantly.

Cultivating Holistic Learners through Comprehensive Attainment:

With successful integration of OBE into curriculum, IQAC has played a significant role in promoting all-round development of students by creating standards for measuring comprehensive attainment. Through OBE, IQAC ensures students' proficiency in both their core courses and their participation in co-curricular and extracurricular activities. Every student's overall growth is tracked and documented in detail. On successful programme completion, students will receive a Comprehensive Attainment Statement along with mark statement

performance and course outcomes. This statistic reveals proportion of students who successfully passed a particular course and categorizes student scores into different percentage slabs. Pass percentage of courses which are less than 60 percent are reviewed and course teachers are heard by Awards committee.

Semester wise Academic Performance Report of Staff and Students clarifies the status of failures and tracks them for support until they pass a particular course. The review processes make examination and evaluation free from procedural irregularities and bias..

Enhancement in Examination and Evaluation Reforms:

The introduction of Examnr.io, a cloud-based solution, marks a shift from traditional paper-based examinations to an online system. IQAC, in collaboration with CoE, has played a pivotal role in implementing this platform. Continuous hands-on training has empowered staff to proficiently create, schedule, and evaluate online assessments. Examnr.io serves as primary tool for conducting quizzes, assignments, and end-semester Part IV exams. Not only does it make assessments more eco-friendly by transitioning to digital processes, but it also ensures robust security by securely storing all assessment details digitally.

- Conversion of night soil into biofuel for cooking purposes.

- Fallen leaves undergo Vermicomposting and bio-composting processes to produce fertilizers.
